


# Some Top Brass appearing tonight



Field Marshal Sir John FRENCH, Commanderin-Chief, British Expeditionary Force (BEF) 1914 to 1915. A cavalryman, mercurial and a womaniser.

General (later Field Marshal) Sir Douglas HAIG, Commander-in-Chief British Expeditionary Force from 1915. Scottish, a cavalryman, dutiful and a Calvinist. House on Kingston Hill. Responsible for leading more men in the field than any other British soldier, ever (about 2 million in 1918).





General (later Field Marshal) Sir William ROBERTSON, Chief of the Imperial General Staff 1915 to February 1918. Only man ever to rise from Private to Field Marshal rank. Previously a domestic servant after leaving school aged thirteen. 'The cleverest man in the Army'.

General (later Field Marshal) Sir Henry WILSON, Chief of the Imperial General Staff from February 1918. Irish, excellent relations with the French, and with Sir John French. Poor relations with Haig and Robertson (his rival). Assassinated by the IRA in central London in 1922.





Major-General (later General) Sir Henry RAWLINSON, Commander of Fourth Army under Haig, his tactics contributed to the heaviest British casualties on the Somme. Given credit for a string of British victories in 1918.

Lord KITCHENER, Secretary of State for War – therefore now a politician and not in the show. Irish.





Sylvia PANKHURST, a suffragette leader, therefore not a brass.

KAISER Wilhelm II, Emperor of Germany and grandson of Queen Victoria.
