Here she is in the pool having fun doing her exercises.




She sends her love to everybody and is already talking about directing next years panto!! That's the target and she will do it!



The Ghost Train

Your intrepid correspondent is just back from a most thrilling weekend – what! In fact not just thrilling but pretty scary too, by Jove! That constantly surprising company, SGF, staged two quite distinct versions of that amateur stalwart: *The Ghost Train*, by Arnold Ridley. I was fortunate to secure tickets to both evenings or I would not have believed it was the same play, don't you know.





Expertly directed by a new artistic partnership of Tony Tresigne and Scott Milligan, this proved an excellent collaboration assisted by a cast playing their jolly old socks off – what!

For the Friday performance the cast was augmented by several well-fortified members of the audience playing a leading role, as did Prompt (always a terrific part in SGF plays). This was a brave directional move which resulted in a delightfully improvised and camp performance from the slightly surprised cast who gamely entered into the spirit, if not the ghost. On the Saturday the audience were invited to merely watch the play and a far more chilling performance ensued with the tension and ghostly atmosphere racked up.





Vicky Maunder as the mad Julia stunned everyone with her screams and Sandie Glenny and Nigel Bellwood were perfect foils as her supposed captors.



Of course SGF is always at the forefront of dramatic innovation and Veronica Birley gave a standout performance as Saul the Station Master in this genderneutral casting.

The usual role of Teddie was also transformed by the wonderful Suzanne Nail into the delightfully obtuse Tessie until she showed her mettle and trapped the villains.





The couples caught up in the drama were expertly played by the darling thespian partners Karina Ramnarain and Adrian Treloar, together with Janice Smith and Chris Brookes as the squabbling, interminably-married couple.





Finally a special mention for the debut performance of newcomer, Mark Springthorpe, who was most convincing as Inspector Jackson; we shall see much more of this young actor, mark my words.

As usual no expense was spared with the set, lighting and special effects which were

certainly up to the standard expected from this enterprising troupe. No, there was no train actually on stage, but who would have known that, so dramatic was the production both nights. Huge congratulations to all the cast and directors for a most enjoyable show.

The chairty offers a number of opportunities designed to build trust and confidence between men and boys, to create strong and positive relationships.



Kingston Samaritans are celebrating their fiftieth anniversary

this year and thanked us, on behalf of their volunteers, for our donation of £500 after *The Ghost Train* in May.

The Samaritans offer a safe place for people to talk any time they like, in their own way – about whatever's getting to them. Volunteers are trained to be good listeners, to be sensitive to callers' distress and to explore feelings, including those which may lead to suicidal thoughts. Kingston Samaritans does not receive funding from government nor from the national Samaritans charity.

The branch provides support locally through its various Outreach activities, which include working in partnership with the YMCA in Surbiton, Network Rail and Wandsworth Prison. They also attend and run workshops and events in schools throughout the community and support events at both Kingston University and Kingston College.

So – for everyone who comes to see our shows, every bottle of wine drunk and dinner devoured help to share our good fortune.
